Minnesotans without Health Insurance

Every year, the U.S. Census Bureau—in its Current Population Survey (CPS)—reports the number of people who are uninsured. This widely quoted number is intended to offer an estimate of how many people did not have any type of health insurance at any point in time during the previous calendar year.



There are many people, however, who are uninsured for a portion of a year but not for the entire year. Though these individuals may suffer severe consequences to their health and their economic well-being as a result of being uninsured, they are not included in the Census Bureau's number.

In March 2009, Families USA released a new report, *Americans at Risk: One in Three Uninsured*, which was designed to provide a comprehensive picture of how many Americans were directly affected by the lack of health coverage in 2007-2008. That report contains national data, as well as a detailed discussion of the methodology, and it is available online at www.familiesusa.org. This fact sheet presents new state-specific data that mirror the national data in *Americans at Risk*.

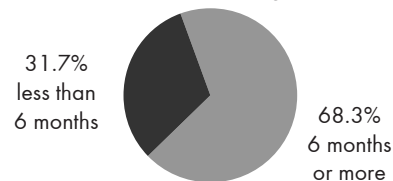
Non-Elderly Minnesotans Without Health Insurance In 2007-2008

- Nearly one out of four people (24.1 percent) in Minnesota under the age of 65 went without health insurance for all or part of the two-year period 2007-2008 (see chart).
- Of the 1.1 million uninsured Minnesotans, more than two-thirds (68.3 percent) went without health coverage for six months or longer during this period.

Likelihood of Uninsured Minnesotans Under Age 65 Remaining Uninsured for Six or More Months during 2007-2008



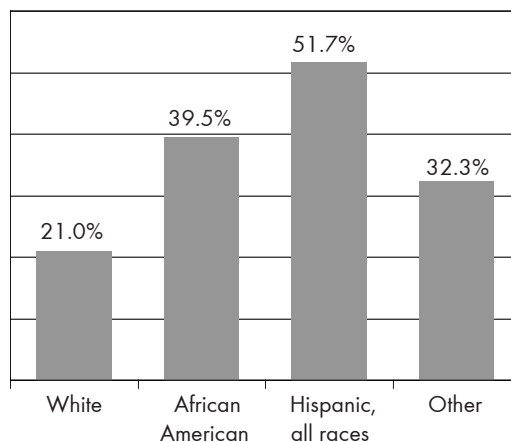
Minnesota's Communities of Color Without Health Insurance

- People of racial and ethnic minorities are more likely to go without health insurance than whites. In Minnesota, 51.7 percent of Hispanics/Latinos, 39.5 percent of African Americans, and 32.3 percent of “other” ethnic minorities were uninsured, compared to 21.0 percent of whites.
- Despite the fact that people of color are far more likely to be uninsured, white Minnesotans made up the largest category (73.1 percent) of people under the age of 65 without health insurance for all or part of the two-year period.
- The category of “other” is composed of individuals who identify themselves as American Indian, Aleut or Eskimo, Asian or Pacific Islander, or who identify themselves as a member of more than one group (e.g., white-black, white-Asian, black-Asian).

Percent Uninsured during 2007-2008, by Race and Hispanic Origin



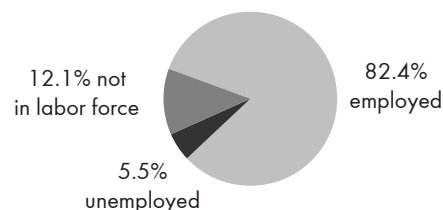
Working Minnesotans Without Health Insurance

- Most uninsured Minnesotans (82.4 percent) are members of working families.
- The remaining 17.6 percent of uninsured Minnesotans who were not working were either actively searching for employment or were not in the labor force because they were disabled, chronically ill, family caregivers, or not looking for employment for other reasons.

Low-Income Minnesotans

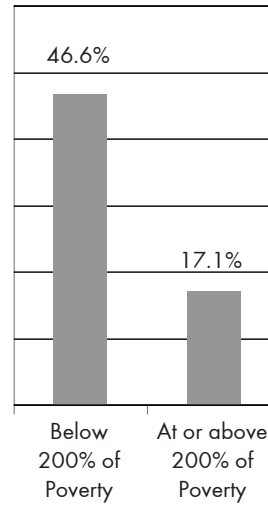
Without Health Insurance

- Families in Minnesota with incomes below 200 percent of the federal poverty level (\$20,800 a year for a single adult and \$35,200 a year for a family of three in 2008) were much more likely to be uninsured than families with incomes at or above 200 percent of poverty.
